McCallister said, "I'm an airplane-aholic as most of us are. Light sport, because of the science, the speed, and the cost, is the part of aviation that is going to be strong. People can get an aircraft and have a blast on weekends, which is what light sport is all about."

Airport Board member Martin said the healthy crowd at the Midwest LSA Expo helps promote the airport and the

community.

"Some are interested in getting started with flying. Some are looking at upgrading their planes. It's just like buying a car," Martin said. "It brings in a lot of people from out of town and out of state who have to stay at motels and have to eat. It brings in money to our economy, and they all seem to like our facility."
